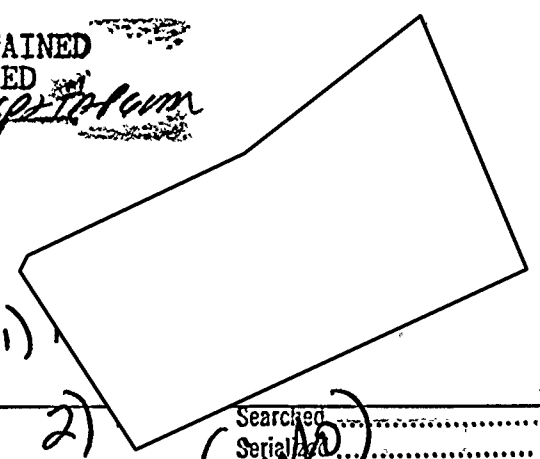

Scientologists Protest Religious Persecution

Scientologists in Austin joined hundreds of thousands of Scientologists across the United States as churchmen and religious leaders picketed FBI buildings to call for indictment of FBI "black baggers, conspirators, and admitted criminals in the FBI.

The massive protest was launched on the heels of a Church four year investigation of the FBI during which it found that the FBI had infiltrated its early organization in 1957 and that the FBI had "aided and abetted" an international intelligence campaign directed against the Church. Hundreds of thousands of Freedom of Information documents, state the Scientologists, show willful dissemination of false information and blatant lies.

The picketers charged the Justice Department with discriminatory prosecution. "FBI agents who break the law walk free as heroes while the entire weight of the Justice Department is used against church members who attempted to defend their religious beliefs," Washington, D. C. Church Spokesman stated.

Austin Church spokesman, Danny Chadwell commented, "Documents prove conclusively that the FBI has abridged the first amendment for more than two decades."

The Church has recently issued a 400 page booklet of documents which expose an international intelligence black propaganda campaign which it says was intended to annihilate the Church in more than 14 countries.

A 700 page booklet of documents about to be released by the Church will document a 28 year FBI hate crusade against Scientology. The documents reveal the spreading of FBI lies to Air Force, Army, and Navy Intelligence, CIA, FDA, Post Office, Immigration and Naturalization Service, and many others. The FBI used unsigned hate letters, rumors, and newspaper articles as their sources, and as late as 1974 were still repeating 1951 falsehoods which had been retracted by the source two decades earlier.

Chadwell observed that "the Church has had no involvement with national security matters and has no history of actions that would bring down the wrath of the government on us before we were even really started as a religious organization. It's time that this taxpayer financed religious discrimination ended."

Signs by the legions of picketers in downtown Austin called for "Reform the FBI", "FBI Gone Too Far", and "Justice, Indict FBI Criminals". The orderly demonstration was joined by members of the Churches of Scientology from Houston, Dallas, and San Antonio who are concerned with the growing federal encroachment on first amendment rights of the Church.

Chadwell, in summing up the demonstration, stated, "It's time the FBI countered growing crime, not growing churches."

Enclosed for FBIHQ is a Code of Ethics for Government Service; February 1979 issue of "Freedom" newspaper; and an American Citizens for Honesty in Government flyer.

On 2/20/79, the Federal Building, 300 East 8th Street, Austin, Texas, was the site of a peaceful demonstration involving alleged members of captioned groups. The demonstration was aimed at the FBI specifically and shortly after commencing, two members of the group appeared in the reception room of the Austin Resident Agency requesting to see the SSRA. SSRA met with the two members who requested that their documents be posted on a bulletin board at which time the SSRA examined the documents and acknowledged that he would be glad to exhibit these documents as requested. These two representatives appeared taken aback as if they were expecting a major debate to occur. They thanked the SSRA and departed the resident agency space without comment. No further contact encountered.

BOSTON ATTORNEYS LINKED TO UNDERWORLD IN PLOT TO LOOT HUBBARD ESTATE



Boston lawyer Michael Flynn, according to sworn eyewitness statements and other evidence now in the hands of federal investigators, hired a forger to pass a counterfeit \$2 million check.

BOSTON — Two Boston attorneys with ties to organized crime tried to loot the personal estate of *New York Times* list best-selling author L. Ron Hubbard and blame it on the Church of Scientology, according to documents released by Church President Heber Jentzsch and Los Angeles private investigator Gene Ingram.

The conspiracy hinged on a counterfeit \$2 million check drawn on Hubbard's account at the Bank of New England and later used in the sensationalized Riverside, Calif. probate case in an abortive attempt to seize control of the legendary writer's estate. Hubbard's business managers stopped payment on the check before it was cashed.

According to documented eyewitness accounts filed in a Los Angeles Federal District Court, Boston attorneys Michael Flynn and Wayne Hollingsworth continued on page 3

FAMCO: Anatomy of a Conspiracy

On August 28, 1980, a bizarre and sinister twist was added to the old "get rich quick" idea when Flynn Associates Management Corporation (FAMCO) was chartered in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

FAMCO's incorporation marked the birth of an organization which would figure prominently in the criminal conspiracy described in this issue's lead article.

Prior to FAMCO's incorporation, Michael J. Flynn had a very rocky career as a personal injury attorney. Two of the cases early in his law practice serve as examples of his competence.

In 1973, Flynn's client in a much-publicized case of fraud and bank failure pleaded guilty and

was sentenced to six years in prison.

In another case which dragged on for approximately two years, Flynn's client was sentenced to prison for a year and a day and fined \$5,000.

FAMCO's First Client

The seeds of FAMCO were sown in June 1979 when Lavenda Van Schaick, a former parishioner of the Church of Scientology, made contact with Flynn, apparently hoping he could help her make some money from her former connection with the Church.

Flynn did some research into the Church of Scientology to determine if it would be worth his while to take her case.

Apparently impressed with

what he discovered regarding the Church's assets, he began to formulate the scheme that would later become FAMCO.

Flynn filed a "class action" suit on behalf of Ms. Van Schaick in December 1979. Ms. Van Schaick was the only member of the "class."

Method to His Madness

By promising a rapid rate of return of 200 to 400 per cent, Flynn was able to gather several other attorneys to help him with his anti-Scientology enterprise. By mid-1980, he and the other lawyers had filed 27 more lawsuits, each virtually identical to the Van Schaick suit, but scattered across the country.

Legal experts have observed that it was highly improper and an

abuse of the judicial process for such suits to have been filed separately.

The method to Flynn's madness, however, would soon become clear.

Flynn's associate, Thomas Hoffman, assisted him in filing multiple suits. Within short order, they had it down to an exact science.

Money to Make Money

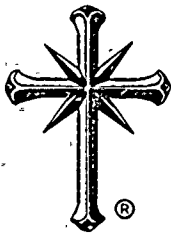
It takes money to make money, as the saying goes, and Michael J. Flynn needed more to continue his litigation.

FAMCO was the answer.

The new corporation was a family affair. The incorporators and officers of FAMCO were Kevin Flynn (Michael's brother), continued on page 13
